Community Plan Pulse Check Starting the Discussion

In 2011 Scenic Rim Regional Council developed and adopted a Community Plan to meet legislative requirements under the Local Government Act 2009. After extensive community consultation, the Scenic Rim Community Plan 2011-2026 was adopted setting out a vision and plan for the Scenic Rim Region.

The Community Plan provides a framework for monitoring and reviewing the Plan, including a review progress to take place every 5 years to review progress towards outcomes and refresh the community vision, outcomes and priorities in the Plan.

Council is committed to undertaking meaningful consultation with the community to start the conversation about amending the plan to reflect changes in the Scenic Rim over the last 5 years.

A number of discussion points, amendments and ideas for further development of the Plan have been identified for further community feedback. Council is seeking general community feedback on the Plan and consultation about the proposed changes outlined in this discussion paper.

Sections and parts of the plan not included in this paper are not proposed for any changes.

Please review this Discussion Paper in conjunction with a copy of the Community Plan.

Why do we need a Community Plan?

In 2012 the Local Government Act 2009 was amended to remove the requirement for local governments to have a Community Plan. Council recognises the vision of the Scenic Rim Community embedded in the Community Plan and believes that this is a valuable document to provide long term direction for the community and the region.

About the Scenic Rim Community Plan

While Council cannot directly deliver all of the values embedded in the Plan, we remain committed to advocating for the implementation of a long term vision for the area which recognises the unique beauty, heritage and landmarks as reflected in the Plan.

Council's role as an advocate for the Region and the safekeeping of the Plan is not clearly and accurately reflected in the section "About the Scenic Rim Community Plan" which provides context for the entire document.

Subsequently, an amendment is proposed to clarify Council's role in the Community Plan delivery.

A Challenging Future

Scenic Rim's future continues to be challenging. Council recognises the emergence of a number of competing priorities for the region as it moves forward, as well as shifts in industry and employment.

To recognise these changes, Council is proposing some amendments to this preamble section of the Plan.

CURRENT WORDING

WHAT HAS CHANGED

Coal mining and coal seam gas extraction

The world's ever increasing energy demand is generating renewed interest in the region's resources. Impacts from exploration and production could put our environment, lifestyle and rural and tourism industries at risk. It remains unclear if these industries, which require State Government approval, will seek to develop in our region. In recent times a number of high impact industries have begun to establish themselves in the Scenic Rim Region. Council considers that there are increasing threats to the environment, lifestyle, rural and tourism industries emerging from high impact primary production in addition to the threat of coal mining and coal seam gas extraction in the region. It is proposed that these threats should be recognised by the Community Plan. The proposed amendment broadens the communities concerns to reflect additional high impact industries.

High impact industry growth

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

The world's ever increasing resource demand is generating renewed interest in the region. Impacts from <u>coal mining, coal seam</u> gas exploration and <u>high impact</u> <u>primary production</u> could put our environment, lifestyle and rural and tourism industries at risk. It remains unclear if <u>coal and coal seam gas</u> industries, which require State Government approval, will seek to develop in our region <u>and there is an</u> increase in interest in the Scenic Rim as an intensive farming area.

A global community

Our region is influenced by global and national issues and trends. We need to consider challenges such as climate change, peak oil, food and water security in terms of their impacts and opportunities for our region. We must ensure our own actions make a positive global contribution. Developing trends in workforce planning and developments in technology which enables work from home arrangements has allows for remote workforce potential in the region.

This amendment reflects the increasing importance of technology and connectivity, not only in everyday life but in facilitating economic growth and business development in the region.

Retaining Canungra's village atmosphere and main street.

Protecting Tamborine Mountain's creative lifestyle and unique natural environment by carefully managing tourism and controlling development.

WHAT HAS CHANGED

When the Community Plan was established, it looked to identify discrete goals for specific towns and villages of the Scenic Rim.

Gaps currently exist as not all towns and villages were recognised with individual priorities, effectively excluding them from the community's vision.

At this review point, Council feels that the overarching community plan principles should be whole of region focused and that plans to revitalise and restore individual areas of the Scenic Rim achieved through targeted plans for town centres and village spaces.

This will ensure that valuable communities of the Scenic Rim Region are all recognised by the Plan while also ensuring shared goals for the Region's towns and villages.

This review has identified duplication across Regional centre goals and where relevant, duplications have been suggested for deletion.
